**Big Idea: Pleasure over presence is never enough.**

**Ecclesiastes 2:1-11 (NLT)**

<sup>1</sup> I said to myself, “Come on, let’s try pleasure. Let’s look for the ‘good things’ in life.” But I found that this, too, was meaningless. <sup>2</sup> So I said, “Laughter is silly. What good does it do to seek pleasure?” <sup>3</sup> After much thought, I decided to cheer myself with wine. And while still seeking wisdom, I clutched at foolishness. In this way, I tried to experience the only happiness most people find during their brief life in this world.

<sup>4</sup> I also tried to find meaning by building huge homes for myself and by planting beautiful vineyards. <sup>5</sup> I made gardens and parks, filling them with all kinds of fruit trees. <sup>6</sup> I built reservoirs to collect the water to irrigate my many flourishing groves. <sup>7</sup> I bought slaves, both men and women, and others were born into my household. I also owned large herds and flocks, more than any of the kings who had lived in Jerusalem before me. <sup>8</sup> I collected great sums of silver and gold, the treasure of many kings and provinces. I hired wonderful singers, both men and women, and had many beautiful concubines. I had everything a man could desire!

<sup>9</sup> So I became greater than all who had lived in Jerusalem before me, and my wisdom never failed me. <sup>10</sup> Anything I wanted, I would take. I denied myself no pleasure. I even found great pleasure in hard work, a reward for all my labors. <sup>11</sup> But as I looked at everything I had worked so hard to accomplish, it was all so meaningless—like chasing the wind. There was nothing really worthwhile anywhere.

- We use pleasure to escape.
- We use possessions to build an identity.
- We leverage people instead of loving people.
- We trust money to give us security that it can't provide.
- We follow desire, hoping it will satisfy us.

### **Ecclesiastes 2:24-26 (NLT)**

<sup>24</sup> So I decided there is nothing better than to enjoy food and drink and to find satisfaction in work. Then I realized that these pleasures are from the hand of God. <sup>25</sup> For who can eat or enjoy anything apart from him? <sup>26</sup> God gives wisdom, knowledge, and joy to those who please him. But if a sinner becomes wealthy, God takes the wealth away and gives it to those who please him. This, too, is meaningless—like chasing the wind.

### **GROUPS QUESTIONS**

1. What stood out to you most in this week's message, and why?

2. Read Ecclesiastes 1:1–11. What stands out to you about how life “under the sun” is described?
3. What are some common things we tend to chase for lasting fulfillment? Why do we keep going back to those things even when they don’t fully satisfy?
4. Read Ecclesiastes 3:11. What do you think it means that God has placed eternity in the human heart?
5. Read Ecclesiastes 1:15–18. What do you notice about the limits of wisdom, effort, or control in fixing what feels broken?
6. Pastor Bill shared that temporary things cannot do eternal work. Why do you think it is so easy to expect more from them than they can give?
7. Read John 10:10. Where in your life do you sense there may be a gap between the life Jesus offers and the way you are currently living?
8. When you look honestly at your own life, what is one thing you are relying on to satisfy you that has not been able to deliver?
9. As you reflect on your current season, what is one specific area where you need to stop chasing “more” and begin surrendering that desire to God?
